If using polyester, just focus on one color at a time and keep your designs simple. 9) Spandex Spandex is made for garments, but it can be used to embroider as well. It's great if you want something really stretchy that will move with the body, although spandex is not the best option for beginners because it can be tough to work with. Even though spandex is one of the most common materials used in dance garments, there are still some issues when it comes to sewing with it. The "stickiness" of this cloth makes it hard to keep stitches straight at times. I also find that they are prone to snagging, which can make sewing more frustrating if you are trying to complete a project on deadline. This is definitely my least favorite material. 8) Thick Heat-set Polyester The next thing on our list of cheapest materials is the thick heat-set polyester which is made to withstand wrinkles, wrinkles, and more wrinkles. This material can be quite difficult to work with, but it's good for beginners because it's durable and sturdy. Many first-time sewers choose this polyester as their first choice because it is easier to handle than spandex.
